

Timberland Pollinator Garden

The Pollinator Garden was designed and installed by Club Members as a demonstration and teaching garden at the Timberland Park. The objective of the garden is to showcase the delightful flowers and grasses that can attract pollinators of all sorts including bees, butterflies and hummingbirds throughout the year.

The garden is in full sun and after researching and collaborating with the Park Ranger 18 different varieties of Tennessee Native plants were selected. We made our choices based on year round seasonal interest, varied heights and textures all providing habitat, food and nectar sources for many pollinators throughout their life cycles. Most of the plants came from Gro-Wild and Moore and Moore Garden Store.

One of the highlights of the garden is the bee hotel which has already welcomed many guests. Additionally, rocks, driftwood, and pottery were added along a wood chip path for interest. The area is about 200 square feet.

The garden is being used today by the park rangers for workshops on native plants and pollinators. The plants in the garden will be listed in an informational book kept in the park office. The garden was designed as a Monarch habitat.
